² A minimum of 12 credits of language concentration in Greek, Latin or Hebrew drawn from reading classes beyond the intermediate levels. Note: BITH 443/BITH 635/BITH 636 Hebrew Exegesis may count for Hebrew.

³ Select up to 14 hours of the following course electives:

- Any upper level offerings in a classical language and other courses by petition
- Beginning and intermediate level offerings in other classical languages (GREK/LATN/HEBR 101, 102, 201)
- Other CL approved advanced exegesis (BITH 532, 635, 636, 646, 647) or classical language courses offered in the Graduate School.
- BITH 451 Greek Exegesis
- ARCH 418 Akkadian Cuneiform
- PHIL 311 History of Philosophy Ancient & Medieval

-After 201 (competency), all upper level courses are open to students. Greek Herodotus, Homer (Iliad & Odyssey), Sophocles, Plato; Adv. Latin Readings; Hebrew texts (canonical and extra-canonical)
