

#### Introducing Liaison

This is the fifth publication of *Liaison* and is designed for alumni and friends of the graduate psychology programs at Wheaton College, including doctoral and master's level curricula.

#### **Facts**

- The Psy.D. program in Clinical Psychology was established in 1993 and has been continuously accredited by the American Psychological Association since 1998. This five-year program admits some 18-20 students annually.
- The M.A. program in Clinical Psychology, a twoyear program, was established in 1977 and admits approximately 30 students each year.
- In 1999, an additional Master's degree was added in Counseling Ministries, a one-year degree for individuals who primarily work through churches or mission agencies.

### Changes Made to the Psy.D. Curriculum

As credit hours to complete degree contract, opportunities to develop professional depth expand.

#### **PSY.D. PROGRAM NOW 120 CREDIT HOURS**

A significant alteration to the Wheaton College Doctor of Psychology degree requirements was instituted for the 2007-08 academic year. Until this year, the degree was 125 credit hours, comprised of 87 core Psychology credits, 16 elective Psychology credits, and 22 Bible and Theology credits. Under the new plan, students must successfully complete 120 total credit hours. These hours must include 86 core Psychology credits, 14 elective Psychology credits, and 20 Bible and Theology credits. All elective courses in Psychology are now 3 credits. See Figure 1 at left.

The rationale for making these changes is rooted in multiple factors. First, most professional licensing boards require 3-hour courses (rather than 2-hour or 4-hour courses). Many of our students found themselves having to take a 1-hour independent study or an additional 2-hour course to meet the licensing requirement. Conversely, students often end with more hours than needed in other courses when they have a 4-hour course in a particular subject.

Second, students are now being advised to take a coherent sequence of four electives that will help them develop depth in a selected area of practice (e.g., child clinical, assessment, clinical geropsychology, etc.). By offering 3-hour elective courses, students are better able to intentionally pick a course sequencing that will enhance their competence in a specific area of professional practice.

Last, these program changes bring the Wheaton College Psy.D. Program closer to other Psy.D. programs with regards to overall credit requirements. An important outcome of this change is that it reduces potential student debt load. We desire that students depart into the profession as financially unburdened as possible to meet one of the missions of the Program — to serve the underserved.

## EXPANDED CHILD PSYCHOLOGY COURSE OFFERINGS

The Psychology Department added two new courses in the area of child clinical psychology at the request of a significant number of students who wanted to serve this often underserved population. Full-time faculty member, Dr. Kelly S. Flanagan, whose specialty is child clinical psychology, joins Dr. Sally Schwer Canning in offering additional child-focused courses. The new courses are Developmental Psychopathology and Child Assessment. Both are 3 credit elective courses. The department is excited to add these courses and to encourage students to develop more depth in an area of professional interest.

Dr. Kelly Flanagan is a graduate of Penn State University Clinical Psychology Program with a specialization in the areas of child clinical and developmental psychology. Her internship was completed at Children's Memorial Hospital in Chicago. Clinically engaged at Heartland Counseling in Elburn, IL (part of the Center for Rural Psychology), Dr. Flanagan provides therapy and psychological assessment, as well as supervision of graduate students in their clinical work with children.

Her research seeks to better understand the reciprocal influences between children's peer relationships and their individual functioning, with a particular interest in negative peer group experiences (e.g., victimization, rejection).
