² The URBN major requires one of the following social science courses: URBN/IR 362, URBN/PSCI 385, ECON 347, URBN 373, URBN/ANTH 383, URBN/ANTH 393

³ Research and Design courses can be met with any of the following: AHS 391, ANTH 482, B EC 321, ECON 375, MATH 263, GEOL 371, GEOL 372, SOC 383.

⁴ URBN majors are required to take 6-14 elective courses. These courses will bring the total number of major hours to 40. See the college catalog for the full list of courses that are URBN major electives.

⁵ URBN 399 must be taken the semester prior to the Wheaton in Chicago term.

⁶ Wheaton in Chicago (WIC) program may be taken in almost any fall or spring semester. The usual sequence suggests that students take URBN 114 prior to WIC, and the URBN 494 (2 credits) the next spring semester following WIC, although exceptions can be made to this ordering of courses according to student need. URBN 399 (0 credits) is always taken the semester prior to WIC.

Additional URBN courses available during WIC are listed by semester below. Major courses BITH 376 (which is in place of BITH 315 in the CATC Shared Core) and URBN 233 are ONLY available during WIC. All internships/practicum may be taken for URBN major credit, and they may be taken for completion of internship credits in another academic department as well (see the other academic department for additional internship requirements).
