¹ Courses that meet CATC tags: PSYC 101 (SI), PSYC 268 (AAQR), optional choice for Foundational Processes- NEUR 241 (SIP, SP). A maximum of three themes may be applied to meet both Thematic Core requirements and major requirements.

² Before completing PSYC 101 you might consider taking PSYC 317 Developmental Psychology, PSYC 241 Social Psychology or PSYC 235 Cross-Cultural Psychology. These have no prerequisites and count as major electives (minimum of 10 credits of major elective required).

³ Foundation Processes course: select 2 from: PSYC 343 Sensation and Perception, PSYC 345 Learning, PSYC 351 Cognition, NEUR 241 Foundations of Neuroscience (also fulfills Scientific Practice thematic core tag and a Scientific Issues and Perspectives thematic core requirement), or PSYC 355 Advanced Statistics and Psychological Testing. **All the Foundational Processes courses except NEUR 241 require PSYC 269.**

⁴ 10 electives credits from any courses Psychology courses is required.

⁵ All majors must take one Psychology Advanced Topic. These include: PSYC 482 Theories and Methods of Integration, PSYC 483 Advanced Topics in Abnormal Psychology, PSYC 484 Psychology of Religion, PSYC 486 Psychology of the Family, PSYC 486 History of Psychology, PSYC 487 Men and Addictions, or PSYC 488 Current Issues in School Psychology. Junior standing is required.

-PSYC 496 Internship or PSYC 497 Collaborative Research are suggested (after completing PSYC 269 or PSYC 497) to prepare for graduate study or for vocational discernment.

-Neuroscience or Biology are recommended for the Christ at the Core Scientific Practice thematic core tag, as these both deal with issues important on psychology, whereas chemistry does less so, and physics and geology do even less so.

-All majors are required to take PSYC 101, 268, and 269. Each one is a prerequisite for the next, so complete that sequence as soon as possible.
