<sup>1</sup> All 101-201 language courses meet the CATC Core Competency requirement for language. Some upper division language courses and electives also carry CATC thematic tags. Note: Latin starts at the 103 level, offered in the Spring.

<sup>2</sup> Student must complete the 201 level in 2 of the 3 languages offered (Greek/Latin/Heb).

<sup>3</sup> A minimum of 12 credits of language concentration in Greek, Latin or Hebrew drawn from reading classes beyond the intermediate levels. Note: BITH 443/BITH 635/BITH 636 Hebrew Exegesis may count for Hebrew. Students pursuing honors must take an additional 4 hours in a language of concentration, plus 4 additional hours in another language, and CLAL 499.

<sup>4</sup> Students with more than one major should consult with their faculty advisor about senior seminar – either complete the CLAL 494 course or substitute the course for an upper division elective in a classical language. This option requires departmental approval.

-After 201 (competency), all upper-level courses are open to students. Greek: New Testament readings, Herodotus, Homer (Iliad & Odyssey), Sophocles, Plato; Latin: Augustine, Ovid, Virgil; Hebrew texts (canonical and extra-canonical)

-Students are advised to avoid interrupting the sequence of language courses.

-All upper division reading courses have prerequisites.

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-The 32 hours required (including 8 hours of 300/400-level courses) are only a <u>minimum</u>. Students are advised to consider more electives in the major. In particular, a rewarding option is the departmental honors pathway (see note 3 above).

-Students may also consider an IM (integrated major) which consists of 40 hours (including 16 in a companion disciple [e.g., English], 12 hours of which may count toward a second major). In general, these programs require only 20 hours in a single classical language (including 8 hours at the 300/400-level).

-In all CL programs, it is advised that students begin 101 courses in the first year, although it is still possible to complete a major if beginning in the second year.
