

Introduction

An internship gives you the opportunity to explore the exciting and challenging realities of “real world” work, while preparing you to learn and grow more. That’s why internships are a key component of the CVC’s Blueprint.



KNOW YOURSELF — You will learn more about who you are now and later. Whether it be on your first day or six months after you leave, you will learn more about who you are through your internship. Reflective work will help you see: what fascinates you and what is a snooze, what you are naturally skilled at and where you struggle, and how your real world experience aligns or misaligns with your values.

EXPLORE POSSIBILITIES — You will explore what is possible. An internship can open your eyes to what needs exist in a broken world, and the best internships teach interns all there is to know about a specific organization (industry, structure, politics, and more). The best interns are individuals who take initiative for their experience. These interns ask questions and seek out growth rather than wait for it to come to them!

PREPARE — You will be better prepared for that future job. Not only do you have the opportunity to develop skills and strengthen your resume through interning, but you have the chance to make authentic connections with professionals in an industry or role you may pursue.

LAND — You will increase your chances of landing where you want to be after graduation. 2018 research shows that nearly 60% of interns are offered full time jobs after their internship. And, a 2017 study indicates that those who have interned are more likely to be admitted to graduate school than those who haven't.

I. Purpose

The *my*Internship reflective curriculum aims to orient, guide, and equip students using readings, reflections, discussions, and multimedia content, so that students realize seven key learning outcomes.

II. Learning Outcomes

Those who complete the *my*Internship reflective curriculum in conjunction with an internship experience will...

1. Develop strong abilities to establish and evaluate the holistic learning that surrounds their internship experience.
2. Cultivate personal and professional relationships, as well as, the capacity for independent thought and action.
3. Pursue knowledge with discernment and humility as they map both the rich connections and the conflicts between their internship experience and academic learning.
4. Demonstrate holistic learning by engaging constructively with racial, cultural, social, and religious diversity with the goal of learning to treasure the breadth and scope of Christ's church and God's world.
5. Develop a substantive understanding of what the Bible teaches about vocational experiences and how they fit into godly living.
6. Demonstrate a growing ability to draw together and articulate their interests, skills, values, and faith into coherence and integrity.
7. Draw upon their learning to serve the church and benefit society worldwide, as they respond to the callings of Christ.
