to Prepare Your 8th Grader for High School

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You play a critical role in helping your 8th grader make the jump to high school.

It's at this point that big questions like "Who am I?" "What is true?" and "What is my purpose?" begin to surface. With the following three activities you can build a space for your 8th grader to have authentic conversations with you and trusted mentors.

3 ways you can prepare your 8th grader for high school



1. PLAN A RETREAT

Celebrate the end of middle school! It doesn't need to be extravagant—think about what your child likes to do or a place they love. You can fill a day or weekend with those things and places.

If your child loves to talk, it can simply be sitting across from each other in a coffee shop or on a park bench. If they're a little more hesitant to share their feelings, take away some of the pressure by being active

While it's good to have a few insights prepared, don't feed your child answers, predict their responses, or steer the conversation in a

certain direction. Let their responses be theirs!

If your child is more of an internal processor, ask them to write about these questions first. They might feel more comfortable getting their thoughts on paper before sharing.

Example Questions

Some starter questions:

- What went well?
- What did you not like?
- What did you feel like when...?

To dig deeper, ask follow-up questions:

- What do you want to do differently in high school?
- How do you think you've grown?

Now, start setting the vision for the next step:

Ideas!

o Play a board game

Walk in the park

Craft together Participate in a sport

- What are you excited about?
- What makes you nervous?
- What do you want to do?
- Who do you want to be in high school?

2. FIND THE FIVE

Cara Powell from Fuller Youth Institute offers this: "Despite the age segregation that exists in our churches and broader culture, each young person is greatly benefited when surrounded by a team of five adults. We call this the new 5:1 ratio."

Who are your child's 5?

If you can name them, awesome! Skip down to the next paragraph. If you can't? That's okay, too. If there's someone who's solid in their faith and sets an example of who you want your child to look up to, send that person a text or pull them aside and ask if they'd spend time with your child in a way that makes sense.

Don't be afraid to ask!

The time spent together doesn't need to look the same for everyone. Maybe it's a college student inviting your child out for a movie or a youth group leader at church asking to grab coffee. Perhaps a grandparent (or adopted Check out Sticky Faith by Cara Powell

grandparent!) needs help with a project at home. These are perfect opportunities to have your child spend time with a mentor figure.

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If you're able to do this before the "you and me retreat," ask the mentors to write a letter to your child. It should encourage, name strengths, and gently challenge their next steps.

3. PROVIDE A PLACE SET APART

Encouraging your child to experience a new environment with new people before the jump into high school is key! At HoneyRock, we've learned that these elements make a powerful learning environment for eighth graders:

• Authentic, Christ-Centered Community

As cabins "do life together" with their cabin-mates and leaders, they're experiencing powerful opportunities for meaningful conversations. This is what forges lasting relationships.


Compelling, Relevant Conversations Around Life's Big Questions


