SPIRITUAL CARE

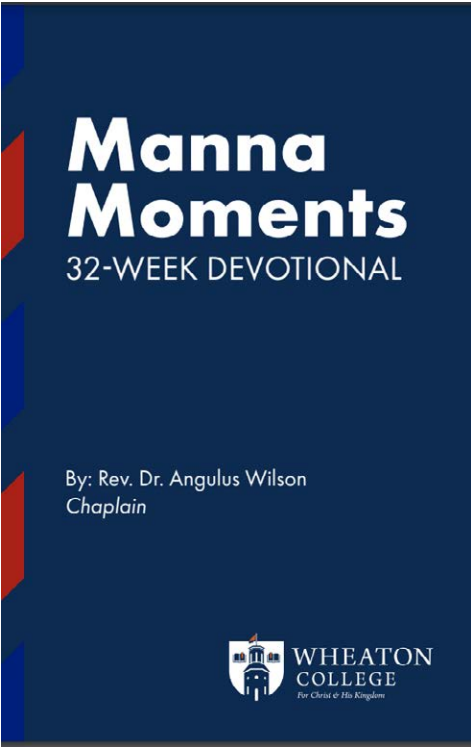

A REFLECTION ON PSALM 43:5

“Why, my soul, are you downcast? Why so disturbed within me? Put your hope in God, for I will yet praise Him, my Savior and my God.” - Psalm 43:5 NIV

When the sun is shining, when our days are warm, when things seem to be going our way, when worry and sadness are gone, and when happiness is near. This is a general definition of what the ideal life looks like from the surface. However, as we live in a broken and fallen world, we face hurt, evil, betrayal, and the unfairness of it all.

In this passage, the psalmist faces a kind of brokenness that discourages him. He cries out to God and speaks to his own soul. We see his honesty and vulnerability. He is not trying to sugarcoat his feelings as he cries out to God. He admits that his soul is downcast and disturbed.

But he finds hope in the one truth he holds onto: God. The psalmist knows that whatever hurt, betrayal, and discouragement he faces, God is faithful. God is constant and will never fail. More so, because of his strong personal relationship with God, the psalmist is convinced that hope, when placed in God, will never die. Hope in God is sure, and it gives strength to the one who hopes. Why? Because God assures us that He listens, hears, knows, and sees all. He has given us countless examples of His faithfulness in His Word and in the lives of others.



Because He has been faithful then, we can trust that He will be faithful still. He does not condone evil and injustice. He will, in His timing, make all things right.

Although we are not facing the exact same situation this psalmist did, we can definitely relate to the same brokenness and discouragement that comes from living in a sinful and wicked world. We face challenges and oppression from the enemy as we try to walk faithfully before God. And when we do, we too can find hope like the psalmist. Our sure and strong hope is rooted in God and His faithfulness to His children.

This hope will never fail, and it is cause for praise even when we walk through the storms of life.

So, whatever you are facing today, ask yourself: “Where do I find and place my hope?” May God, as you put your hope and trust in Him, give you the strength to persevere and endure as you continue to live faithfully before Him. In His time and in His perfect way, He will set all things right. He sees all that you are going through, and He will not forget your faithfulness to Him.

DISCIPLESHIP MINISTRIES



Discipleship Ministries (DM) exists to cultivate lifelong followers of Jesus Christ through small groups where students are known, loved, and engage in spiritual practices centered on the Gospel.

Discipleship Ministries is comprised of Discipleship Small Groups (DSG), Upper Class Discipleship Small Groups (UCDSG), and Strongholds.

Every DM group is marked by 7 disciplines, which define each gathering:

- 1. Engage Scripture (Open and Read the Bible)
- 2. Pray for One Another
- 3. Apply the Gospel
- 4. Practice Humility: Listen in Love
- 5. Promote Vulnerability: Confess Sin and Share Struggle
- 6. Uphold and Celebrate Kingdom Diversity
- 7. Meet Consistently

The goal for each group is to foster what matters most in life: **entering into life with God together with others by engaging Scripture, prayer, accountability, support, spiritual growth, encouragement, and friendship.**

All discipleship groups span throughout the course of a year, however, we encourage students who enter or transfer into Wheaton mid-year or return from being away to stop by the Chaplain's Office or email us to inquire about small groups they can join.

01 DISCIPLESHIP SMALL GROUPS (DSG)

DSG strives to cultivate lifelong followers of Jesus Christ through the prayer-filled reading of God’s Word in life-giving community. The main priorities of DSG are to engage with Scripture, apply the Gospel, pray with one another, listen in love, confess sin, celebrate kingdom diversity, and meet consistently. These floor-based small groups (in either Fischer or Smith-Traber) are mostly first years and sophomores that meet once a week for 90 minutes.

02 UPPER CLASS DSG (UCDSG)

UCDSG seeks to inspire students to grow in their faith through the reading of Scripture and the development of spiritual disciplines in community. With the accountability of a small group of peers members will be challenged to read Scripture regularly throughout the week, will meet once a week for 90 mins for prayer, fellowship, encouragement, and to discuss and share what they have been reading and experiencing. Groups can be either single- or mixed-gendered and are open to any sophomore, junior, or senior. Members also have the opportunity to request being in a group with other friends who join UCDSG.

03 STRONGHOLDS

Every person has experiences with sexuality, but many of them never feel the safety to voice and tackle these experiences. Strongholds is a joyful, safe, and Gospel-rooted community that pursues freedom from sexual sin and restoration from sexual brokenness by engaging sexuality with Christ at the center. Groups meet once a week for 90 minutes to practice vulnerability, celebrate overcoming temptation, discuss Gospel-centered sexuality, and lift one another up in prayer. Groups are split by gender and welcome students from their first year through their final year.



STUDENT TESTIMONY

Christ calls us onto a path that is difficult and narrow. Christ invites us into a journey that is rewarding and life-giving. Nowhere did I see this tension and beauty – and experience the fruits of it – more than in Discipleship Ministries (DM) during my time at Wheaton. DM provided a loving, restful space every year for me at Wheaton. One of my dearest friends to this day was in my freshman year Discipleship Small Group. I still mentor two girls from the group I led my sophomore year. I keep up to date with the leaders I coached my junior year, and multiple members of the cabinet I led senior year have flown out to visit me after we all moved post-graduation.

Additionally, I still turn to Ray Chang and my own small group leader, Ms. Candice Eisenhauer (Health Professions Director who has committed to serving in DM), for advice. Relationships that are formed when a group of individuals gathers around Jesus together truly last a lifetime. DM gave me a picture of what it looks like for the Church to be a family. Not only did this usher me into deeper relationship with the Triune God while I was at Wheaton, but it has also given me a model of what to look for and help create in my new local community. Many people have never experienced the intentional encouragement, self-giving support, and loving mutual accountability that I found commonplace in DM. I now have a passion for fostering these types of environments in the world outside of Wheaton so that all may receive these good gifts from God.

Looking back now as an alumna I am able to see how essential these experiences were to my development as a Christ-following leader. The trainings and practical application opportunities I had in DM have equipped me for a multitude of scenarios.



I see the influence of DM in how my new roommates and I do life together, in my ability to listen well and facilitate conversation as I pursue my career as a psychologist, and in my confidence to step boldly with Christ into difficult situations. Because Ray Chang and others in DM believed in me and afforded me great responsibility within the ministry as Chair, I have learned how to use my voice to advocate for others, how to lead a team full of diverse perspectives and skill-sets, and how to trust in God to meet our needs practically.

Today, I lead a Christ-centered small group in southern Virginia that seeks to encourage people in their faith, while also finding ways to work against the sin of racism. The ages, races, ethnicities, and nationalities in the group are incredibly diverse and the topics we discuss are extraordinarily sensitive, intimate, and personal; DM played a large part in my ability to partner with Jesus in facilitating such a group. I believe true discipleship in Christ is the key to many of the issues facing the world and Church today and I am unendingly grateful for the ways DM trained me up in the way I should go and impacted my eternity.

WHEATON COLLEGE CHAPEL



Chapel at Wheaton College is a time of corporate, Christian worship in which we commune with The Heavenly Father and with each other through the exaltation of Jesus Christ as empowered by The Holy Spirit. Chapel Worship is envisioned as an intentional, equitable, organic mosaic where the Gospel is proclaimed and applied, with the shared goal of nurturing Kingdom diversity through a variety of worship experiences reflective of the global evangelical church. Hearing and responding to God’s Word together is central as our community endeavors to worship with unity in the midst of Kingdom diversity. Reading, reflecting on, and explicating Scripture lies at the foundation of chapel planning and execution; Scripture is the lens through which all worship acts (such as prayer, music, arts, testimonies) are expressed.

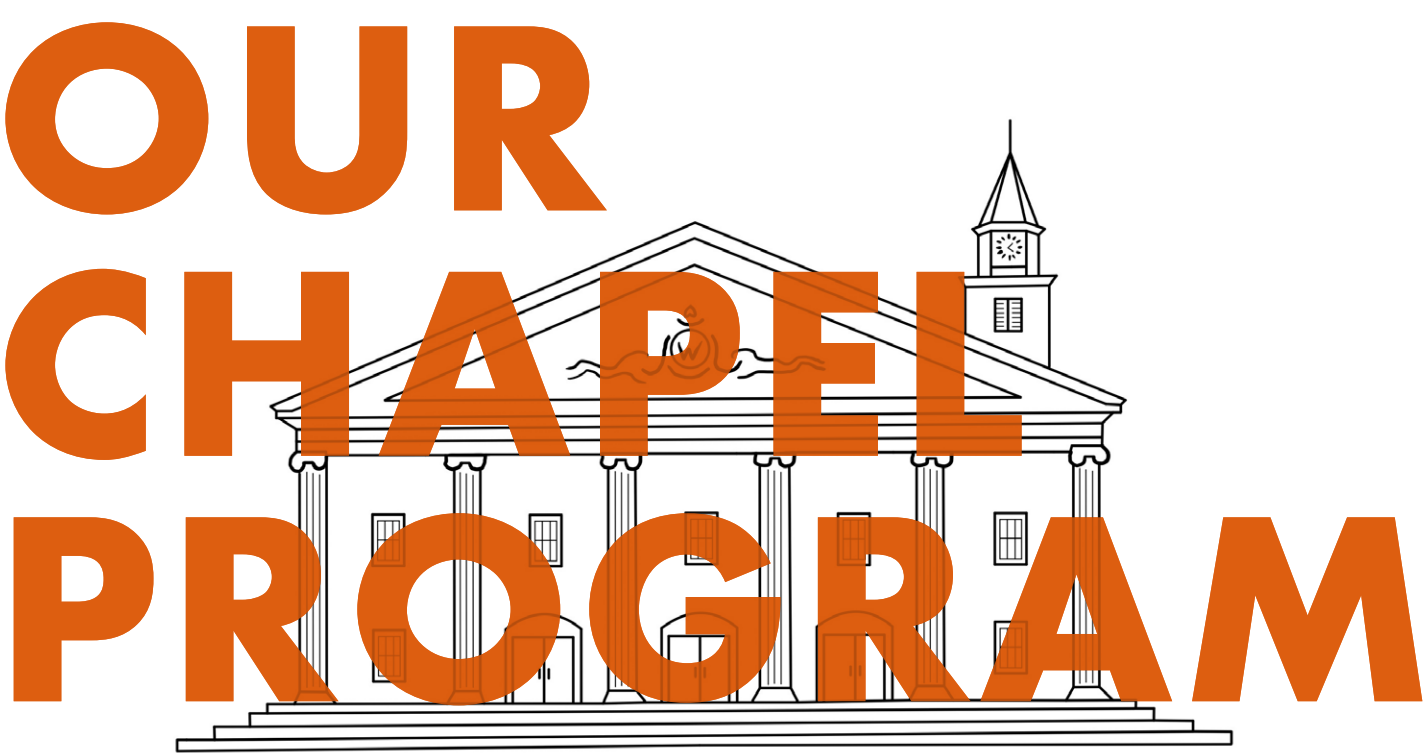

The Chapel program seeks to nurture the spiritual life of students in the context of an academic environment. The graduate and undergraduate student bodies gather together in community every Wednesday at 10:40 AM in Edman Chapel.

The undergraduate student body also gathers on Mondays and Fridays at the same time. Chapel messages are given by our chaplain, president, faculty and staff, as well as guests, known for their Christian leadership and relevant messages to the church and culture.

The various forms and liturgies used in the design of Chapel Worship take advantage of the richness and diversity of Wheaton’s interdenominational constituency; variety in worship forms, traditions, and music enriches the educational and experiential dimension of the chapel program.

Another educational component of chapel includes the consideration of theological, social, ethical, psychological, and political issues from a distinctively Christian and Biblical perspective.

The year verse for the 2023-2024 academic year is 2 Timothy 1:9-10: *“He has saved us and called us to a holy life – not because of anything we have done but because of His Own purpose and grace. This grace was given us in Christ Jesus before the beginning of time, but it has now been revealed through the appearing of our Savior, Christ Jesus, Who has destroyed death and has brought life and immortality to light through the Gospel”* (NIV).

Visitors are always welcome to attend chapel and at times have the opportunity to sit among our faculty and staff.

Chapel Attendance:

Chapel is required for all undergraduate students as part of our college curriculum and commitment to spiritual life.

Undergraduate students are required to attend Monday, Wednesday, and Friday chapels, including occasional Special Services on Thursdays.

Chapel attendance is overseen by the Chaplain's Office.

Eleven (11) chapel absences are permitted each semester; these absences may be used to sleep, study, recover from illness, for doctor's & counseling appointments, non-school related trips, irregular work schedules, interviews, car trouble, trips to the airport, etc.

Students are expected to manage their chapel attendance wisely over the course of each semester and should routinely check their attendance via Banner.



A CALL TO GRADUATE STUDENT LEADERS: INSIGHTS FROM 1 TIMOTHY

Within the hallowed halls of Wheaton College, you, as graduate students, are diligently pursuing excellence in academia and leadership within your respective fields. In this contemplative piece, we shall delve into the timeless wisdom imparted by the Apostle Paul to Timothy, and explore how it resonates with your role as graduate student leaders. Let’s delve into Paul’s Request, Paul’s Revelation, and Paul’s Responsibility.

I. PAUL’S REQUEST FOR TIMOTHY

In 1 Timothy 4:6-7, Paul imparts a profound message to Timothy, one that carries great relevance for us. Donté Alexander Ford is a native of Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, and serves the Wheaton College community as Associate Chaplain for Worship Arts and Assistant Professor of Music. He is an alumnus of Penn State University (BA), Southern Methodist University (MSM, MM, MDiv), and University of Arizona (PhD). Though aptly described as a musician, minister, and scholar, Donté is a loving husband to his wife, Latoya, and a loving father to his sons. At Wheaton, Donté teaches Principles in Music and Worship Ministry, coaches Chapel Bands, oversees the music and worship arts offerings in Chapel worship, and serves as the primary faculty advisor for the [Worship Arts Certificate](#).

Donté's many musical talents have afforded him the opportunity to serve as guest clinician/conductor, lead pianist, opera chorister, resident percussionist, and Minister of Music. His musical activities also include composing, as he is a published composer with GIA Publications, Inc. He is the founder and Artistic Director of Sankofa Chorale, a multi-ethnic choral ensemble that preserves and perpetuates African American Choral music while performing that music alongside choral masterworks of the Western European choral canon.

Christian minister, Donté is a gifted preacher, holding ordination and ministerial credentials in the Holiness-Pentecostal and Baptist traditions, respectively. Though a life-long Pentecostal, Donté is committed to the diversity of the body of Christ.
