Although the passage of the 1965 Voting Rights Act marked a great legislative victory in the struggle for political equality in the United States, it is now increasingly vilified. Professor Burton contends that historians have a responsibility both to the courts and to the general public to explain the history, purpose, and efficacy of the Voting Rights Act. Professor Burton will share about how his Christian faith has informed his commitment as an expert witness for minorities in discrimination and voting cases.

DR. VERNON BURTON is Distinguished Professor of History and Computer Science at Clemson University. The author or editor of 16 books and more than 200 articles, Burton was named the U.S. Research and Doctoral University Professor of the Year in 1999. A nationally recognized expert on the history of race relations in America, Professor Burton has been involved as an expert witness in more than 100 discrimination and voting rights cases across the past three decades.
